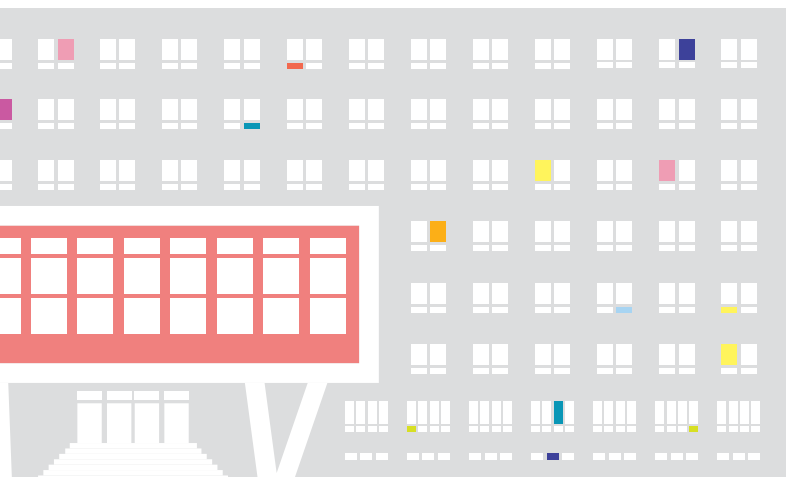

2 Background

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4 Departments

The Faculty of Economics has five departments.

4.1 Department of Economic Theories

The Department staff members are doing research in the field of fiscal and monetary policy, European monetary integration, exchange rates, macroeconomic imbalances, economic growth, global value chains, behavioral economics and optimization methods.

The Department offers courses in the following economic disciplines:

- on the Bachelor level: Microeconomics and Macroeconomics, National Economy, World Economy, International Economics, History of Money, History of Economic Thinking, Economic Policy.
- on the Master level: Monetary Macro-analysis, European Integration, International Trade Forms, Monetary Policy, Crises Management, Introduction to Economic Modelling, Behavioral Finance, Mathematical Economics.
- on the PhD. level: Advanced Macroeconomic and Microeconomic Theory, Monetary Macro-analysis, Theories and Models of Economic Growth.

The Department also offers courses in the following social science disciplines:

- Psychology, Sociology, Social Communication, Ethics and Communication, Diplomatic Protocol, Business Ethics.

Department's staff participates in the following activities organized on the faculty level: Košice Economic Forum (KEF), double diploma programme (University of Nice Sophia Antipolis).

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4.2 Department of Finance

Research activities of the Department are focused on the problems of effective allocation of financial resources and their use in economic regions and all entities of private, public, and non-profit sectors performing economic activities. Research at the Department is also focused on the analysis of small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) with emphasis on their financing in connection with the EU enlargement, the financing of local municipalities, fiscal reforms applied in the Slovak Republic and information sources for financial analysis and accounting.

The Department's teaching activities include Corporate Finance, International Finance, Taxes and Tax Systems, Finance and Currency, Financial Markets, Accounting and Auditing, Public Finance, Economic Policy and Financial Derivatives. The curriculum is a dynamic, keeping up with current trends and innovation in the area of finances. The Department is involved in several research projects.

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4.3 Department of Banking and Investment

The Department's research activities are focused on analysis of foreign direct investments, banking, actuarial science, business process measuring and business modelling, ebusiness, trust building, applications of information technologies in SMEs and public sector (e-Business, e-Procurement, e-Government etc.) and data mining application in socio-economic problems. The Department staffs are involved in several international research projects aimed at socio-economic analysis of applications of information and communication technologies (ICTs) including eBusiness, as well as in national research projects focused on banking, e-Business – performance measuring, decision support systems, risk management, sectoral analysis and measuring competitiveness. Educational projects cover areas of e-Learning, training and advisory services in e-Business management.

The Department offers courses in Banking, Central Banking, Management of Banking Operations, Fundamentals of Investment, Portfolio Management, Financial Derivatives, Actuarial Science, Risk and Uncertainty in Finance, Technical Analysis, Financial Decisions and e-Commerce.

4.4 Department of Regional Science and Management

The Department of Regional Science and Management provides educational, research and expertise activities focused on Regional Development and Public Administration; Management and Marketing, Enterprise and Entrepreneurship, Innovation and Creative Industries.

The Department is involved in several international and national research projects in the area of Regional Sciences, Public Administration, Management, Marketing, Enterprise and Entrepreneurship, Innovation, Clusters, Creative Economy, Local economic impacts and Resilience of regions. The Department participates also in several international educational projects mainly in the area of e-Learning, distance learning, life-long education, transfer of innovation, entrepreneurial education and partnerships in adults learning. These activities enhance the quality of the educational process and enable implementation of modern learning technologies and methods.

The Department supports student activities, e.g. student debate club and organizes the Central European Conference on Regional Science.

The Department offers courses in Management, Human Resource Management, Strategy and Management of Small and Medium Enterprises, Public Administration Management, Managerial Skills Development, Business Economics, Marketing, Financial Institution Marketing, Marketing Research, Business Law, Labour Law and Social Security, Financial Law, Administrative Law, Sustainable Development, Programme and Project Preparation, Project Management, Regional Economy and Policy, Public Economics, Public Administration Theory, Strategic Management and Planning, Regional and Municipal Marketing, Urban and Regional Planning, Innovation Policy, Spatial Economics, Regional Labour Market, Economics and Analysis of Municipal Companies, Local Development, Demographics and Forecasting, Municipal Politics, European Regional Policy, Argumentation and Academic Debate, Managerial Games.

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4.5 Department of Applied Mathematics and Business Informatics

The Department's research activities are focused on the topic of the Information Society in the context of its impact on citizens, education and businesses, as well as the policy aspects and regulatory framework of electronic communication networks. Information sharing on web-based platforms and electronic financial services, e.g. implementation of e-banking and mobile payment systems are investigated as well. The Department is involved in several international and national research projects in the area of Enterprise and Entrepreneurship, Innovation. The Department staff work also as partners in several international educational projects mainly in the area of e-Learning, distance learning, life-long education, transfer of innovation, entrepreneurial education and partnerships in adults learning. Involvement in the research and educational project results into enhancement of provided educational process.

Courses offered by the Department are directed mainly towards application of mathematical and statistical methods and application of information technologies to economic and financial applications, namely Mathematics, Graph Theory, Statistical Methods, Informatics, Economic Information Systems, and Electronic Services in Banking.

- Comprehensive analysis of the state and evolution of life expectancy of inhabitants of Slovakia and abroad and its determinants;
- Scientific extraction causes of death and groups of causes of death and quantification of their impact on the evolution of life expectancy among Slovak population, creation of a forecasting platform;
- Mortality in regions of Slovakia and its socio-economic determinants
- Aging of the Slovak population and its impact on health and social policy of the Slovak Republic;
- Information and communication technologies in healthcare;
- Medical technology and economic aspects of their use in Slovakia;
- Strategic management of the health system in Slovakia;
- Development of economic metrics concepts for Strategic Framework of Slovak healthcare system;
- Long-term health care and social policy.

Project description:

The ORCERIS project (funded by EIT RawMaterials) aims at increasing the success rate of new business ideas for the circular economy and raw materials. It does so by bringing together existing insights and tools for supporting entrepreneurs and firms in adopting circular ideas from 3 previous EIT RawMaterials KAVA projects, and by developing a training programme that those involved in innovation support services can integrate into their activities. Radboud University, VITO and Wuppertal Institute together develop a customized TTT workshop to share their best practices on entrepreneurial activities in the circular economy. Each of the two focal regions, Kosice and Budapest, will then conduct workshops for their target group ranging from start-up firms with a focus on circular business models to established SMEs who would like to explore which possibilities the idea of a circular economy might hold for them.

Project description:

A major challenge for the sustainable economic & social development in the Danube region is the difficulty in accessing finance for small & micro enterprises.

Availability of bank loans for SMEs & spin-offs & social enterprises has since the beginning of the fin. crises declined by more than 25%, while collateral requirements have increased by 34%. SMEs still contribute more than half of total value added in non-financial economy & provided 80% of all new jobs. Lack of finance for small enterprises continues to have a negative impact on the innovative economy & the job market. Banks or public guarantee funds cannot solve this challenge. Current regulations such as Basel IV make it impossible for banks to finance risky innovative businesses. Even the EC identified this as a European Challenge and answers with strategies on alternative financing.

Thus, EUSDR Priority Axis coordinators nominated in April 2016 CrowdStream as a strategic project to address the challenges highlighted under PA 8 COMPETITIVENESS OF ENTERPRISES & PA 10 STEP UP INSTITUTIONAL CAPACITY.

CrowdStream`s main objective is to improve the effectiveness of public/private business-support for innovative spin-offs & social enterprises to access qualitative alternative financing (crowdfunding). The CrowdStream project will initiate a change in the financing market. Due to quality labelling and capacity building activities there will be a major shift from donation based to equity based crowdfunding.

Project description:

High performance computing (HPC) is an emerging general-purpose technology. It can improve framework conditions for innovations by drastically increasing effectiveness of innovations and reducing product development time. However, while most advanced HPC infrastructure and knowledge are located in well-off western parts of the Danube region, enterprises – especially SMEs – from its eastern parts have limited access and competencies. Transnational cooperation in the region is limited, which is further hindering innovation. The main objective of InnoHPC is to create transnational HPC laboratory for co-designing knowledge-intensive innovative products with high value-added in transnational value-chains. Key outputs are transnational InnoHPC Lab pooling regional HPC infrastructure and competencies, web platform providing HPC access, integrated services and capacity building tools, and sustainability toolkit, to support durability of InnoHPC Lab beyond the project. To achieve them, InnoHPC will, first, conduct a focused regional HPC benchmark, second, design and create a transnational InnoHPC Lab, third, develop HPC web platform providing HPC access and capacity-building tools and finally, pilot-test InnoHPC Lab and the platform with two pilots with SMEs in electronic and automotive sectors. InnoHPC targets SMEs and clusters, providing the opportunity to increase efficiency of innovations and join transnational value-chains in the Danube region. Higher education and research institutions with HPC will get access to exciting real-life cases and opportunities to exploit their entrepreneurial potential. Policy-makers and business support organizations will receive a valuable institutional support for their policies and initiatives. InnoHPC project is a pioneering effort to improve framework conditions for innovation by providing unique institutional and technological infrastructure, designed specifically to pool and exploit HPC infrastructure on a transnational level.

Project description:

Territorial attractiveness (TA) is reflected in the set of specific economic, environmental and social potentials of a territory which make it competitive in comparison to other territories. Through good governance, policies can maximise these potentials to increase attractiveness of the regions for residents, visitors and investors. The main challenge in the Danube Region is lack of capacities of target groups involved in development planning for more efficient and cooperative multilevel governance considering the needs of all stakeholders.

The main project objective is to strengthen multilevel and transnational governance and institutional capacities of policy planners involved in territorial development of the Danube Region, which will result in more harmonised governance system of the area. This will be achieved by firstly establishing a permanent common transnational platform for monitoring territorial attractiveness (CO-TAMP), 11 national platforms (TAMP), and Territorial attractiveness atlas. Secondly, we will implement an intensive capacity building programme for empowering multilevel public authorities and civil society in 11 countries related to development planning resulting in enhanced skills and knowledge. Finally, the policy integration process, including transnational workshops, policy recommendations and memorandum of understanding, will capitalise the results and assure the long-term impact and leverage effect in the society. By such innovative approach, combining the capacity building with user friendly web platforms on TA, the target groups will learn to identify and utilise territorial potentials of the Danube Region. Policy planners at all levels representing economic, environmental and social aspects, as well as civil society, business and academia, will be able to better respond to development trends and societal challenges in the region, shaping the territorial policies in order to create a more attractive Danube Region.

Project description:

InnoSchool tackles the need for system change to support weak entrepreneurial culture and low engagement to social innovation and entrepreneurship. Its general objective is to strengthen social innovation and entrepreneurial spirit of secondary schools' students by development and introduction of highly innovative Learning System. InnoSchool Learning System (ILS) will be developed by using intensive learning interaction among project partners and using inclusive design process involving policy bodies, secondary schools, territorial business supporting actors and organizations working in social services. Its main uniqueness lies in two main innovations introduced for adolescents of age 17-18 years – (1) introduction of serious game for online simulations joined with teacher lecturing/guiding sessions to maximize educational impact through experiential learning and (2) social media and interschool competition inclusion to boost attractiveness for students.

Project description:

The purpose of this proposal was the organisation of the Week of Innovative Regions in Europe 2017 (WIRE VIII) conference in Kosice (Slovakia). The conference was held from 28 to 30 June 2017 after the Slovak Presidency of the Council of the European Union. The tasks in 2018 were focused on capitalisation of WIRE2017 results for further conferences and organisers and dissemination activities. In general, the objectives of WIRE VIII are as follows:

- Contributing substantially to maximising and understanding the societal impact of research, innovation and regional policy in digitalisation on regions and people
 - To support R&I ecosystem stakeholders (quadruple helix) in utilization of benefits from digitalisation and enhance trusted initiatives and policy formation for effective innovative and socially responsible regional development

The instantaneous communication in the human society is currently realized mostly over the wireless communication channels. Frequency spectrum is the medium for the information transfer and thus, is extremely utilized. Based on that, it is fundamental to come up with the

new technological and economical strategies that would improve the spectrum effectivity utilization and distribution. Spectrum trading and distribution among the network participants will have in the future highly dynamic character and therefore the economical/technological implementation would need to be able to cover the system dynamics. When dealing with the spectrum trading (e.g. market mechanism) we will be able to formulate several economical views, directly impacting the spectrum trading effectivity. The detailed study of the monopoly, oligopoly and the perfect/imperfect competition among the trading participants will be the core part of our research. Project description:

This Erasmus+ project deals with the prevention of early school leaving, the development of basic and transversal skills and the enhancement of digital education in the context of minorities, mainly Roma. Educational disadvantages and exclusion lead to lacking integration in the labour market and exclusion from society in general, which is a vicious circle in minority communities this project wishes to break.

In three locations in Slovakia, Romania and Kosovo the project implements an innovative educational approach to tackle the issue with more than 100 participating children and youth. In their afterschool and youth programmes teachers and youth workers use specifically designed learning materials to engage students and youth in their own learning process. The chosen *MINIMAX approach* (aiming at minimal teacher invasion and maximum learner autonomy) was originally inspired by the *Self-organized Learning Environments (SOLE) approach*, a widely recognized alternative educational method that supports an individual learning process according to a student's abilities, needs and interests as well as the *Constructionist learning theory*.

The project started with a needs-assessment to tailor the educational materials to the local contexts and needs. Mentors and youth workers were given the opportunity to experience the accordingly developed tools and materials in the framework of special trainings and subsequently implemented the same with the target groups and evaluated them. The team observes the changes in learning disparities, school attendance, school leaving, pursuit of careers and rise in transversal skills like digital competences. Based on the evaluation tools and materials will be improved and again trained to teachers and youth workers. After the three years the partners working with the target groups directly will continue their implementation of the methods, tools and materials – learning with their children and youth in the clouds.

Project description:

Europe has always been a step ahead regarding sustainable transport mode in comparison with the rest of the world and Europe has developed valuable expertise and innovation in the railway sector. That is why, railway is identified in many RIS3. However due to a fierce competition in particular from emerging industries, the whole sector and especially SME are facing big challenges regarding their competitiveness (price based vs. innovation based competitiveness). To tackle this challenge, regions with the help of the EC, put efforts to encourage R&I joint activities (triple helix concept) by offering innovation delivery support in the ERDF OP (direct fundings, cluster policy...). Other initiatives have been launched towards the railway sector but it has been pointed out that SME have specific issues due to the way public transport works, the specificities of its value chain and its market structure (few big companies with thousands of SMEs, few profit margin, low innovation culture, etc.). Taking this into consideration, the RECORD project aims at helping SME to invest more and better in innovation activities by redesigning the regional policy instruments. To do so, we plan individual work to be compared with partnering regions and analyzed. Benchmark and brainstorming sessions with local stakeholders will help draw proven oriented conclusions and develop new approaches together. To have comparability and to be able to share experiences and learn from each other, it is key to admit regional policy structure, industrial environment and clusters differences. Stakeholders engagement in this project is very important as it will be the first time managing authorities, clusters, businesses, universities, other funding organizations, regions etc. are working together early in the political process in the railway sector. This lends credibility and builds solid foundation to develop a framework that will be accepted for implementation.

Study Programmes:

Finance, Banking and Investment: Professional profile of the graduates corresponds to the requirements of financial institutions (e.g. banks, insurance, audit and investment companies) and enables them to apply for managerial positions in public and private sectors. The Faculty offers degrees on: a) Bachelor level (on average three years of study); and b) Master level (another two years of study). PhD study programme is offered in the scientific branch Finance.

Economics and Management of Public Administration: The programme is designed to prepare students for professional and managerial positions in public agencies, governmental departments and administrative entities and non-profit organisations offering knowledge in economics, regional science and public administration. Bachelor and Master study is provided in the study Programme Economics and Management of Public Administration. The corresponding PhD study programme has been renamed to Spatial and Regional Economics.

In the academic year 2017/2018 more than 800 full-time Slovak students, 30 international students, more than 100 part-time bachelor- and master-level students, and 31 internal and 22 external PhD students study at our Faculty.

8 Further Professional Education and Consultation Services

Within the life-long education the Faculty of Economics offers further professional development courses. The course “Finance, Banking and Investment” with a nominal length of four semesters (288 hours of tuition) is focussed on the following target groups:

- University graduates who graduated in non-economic fields and currently are seeking for re-qualification or need training in economics to increase their chances of promotion or obtaining a better job;
- University graduates in economics wanting to update/upgrade their knowledge in the field of finance, banking and investment;
- Unemployed university graduates seeking re-qualification.

The course consists of the following modules: Banking, Financial Mathematics, Tax and Taxation, Financial Markets, Accounting, Corporate Finance, International Finance, Investment, Public Finance, Stock Exchange Market, Financial Derivatives, Actuarial Science, E-Commerce Assistant. The course is accredited by the National Accreditation Committee for Further Education. After successful completion of the course, the participants receive a certificate.

Accredited educational course “Entrepreneurial Competences” offered by the Faculty consists from the following modules:

- Sustainable Development and Business Opportunities,
- Entrepreneurial Creativity and Innovation Management,
- Entrepreneurship,
- Business Planning,
- Small Business Administration,
- Business English.

The Faculty offers also advisory and consultation services in the following areas:

- Financial management, profitability analysis, cost management, price calculation, capital budgeting;
- Finances analysis, financial performance measures;
- Investment tools, derivatives, risk management;
- Financial accounting, reporting, auditing;
- Strategic management and planning;
- Business and financial modelling;
- e-Business, e-Banking, and e-Government applications;
- Trust building mechanism;
- Information system analysis and modelling;
- Regional and local strategies for innovation and human resource development;
- Actuary science, products.

Cooperation with The Slovak Chamber of Tax Advisors

The Slovak Chamber of Tax Advisors, the regional office of Košice, organized this year the 18th year of the competition for the best diploma thesis in the field of taxes. The students of our faculty achieved 1st and 2nd place in this competition.

This year, the SKDP, with its entire national scope, awarded for the second time a prize for diploma and doctoral theses with a tax topic to undergraduates and post-graduates from selected departments of Slovak universities. Our Faculty received two awards for the doctoral thesis.

This agreement sets up better conditions for future development of this cooperation in the field of common economic research.

The Faculty of Economics became the new member of the EIT Climate-KIC in 2018. EIT Climate-KIC is supported by the European Institute of Innovation and Technology. It brings together partners in the worlds of business, academia, and the public and non-profit sectors to create networks of expertise, working together to accelerate the transition to a zero-carbon economy. The faculty coordinator for Climate-KIC activities is Miriam Šebová.

During the academic year 2017/2018 57 of our students participated in the exchange study programs. Three students successfully accomplished their Master program in cooperation with the University Côte d'Azur, Nice, France and five students have been studying there within Bachelor two degree program in 2018/19. Mobilities from other EU countries to Slovakia also took place. 18 Erasmus students from Spain, Italy, France, Romania, Poland, Turkey, Ukraine, Serbia and Moldova studied at our Faculty. In the same academic year, visiting teachers from the partner universities in the Germany, France, Czech Republic, Poland, Turkey, Romania, Hungary, Moldova, and United States gave lectures at the Faculty.

In the academic year 2018/2019 33 our students have already participated in exchange program in winter semester and 20 students will participate in the summer semester.

Within two degree programs, two students from University Côte d'Azur, Nice, France and one student from Khabarovsk State Academy of Law and Economics, Russia, successfully completed their Bachelor or Master studies respectively at our Faculty in 2017/2018.

The Faculty continues the cooperation with the University Côte d'Azur, Nice, France within two diplomas program. French speaking students at our Faculty have the possibility to choose optional courses in French. In the third year of their studies, students have to enroll in the University Côte d'Azur and study directly at this University for two semesters in order to receive a Bachelor degree from the University Côte d'Azur. Up to now, 98 students have been awarded the Bachelor degree, 30 students Master 1 degree, 8 students Master 2 degree, and 2 students PhD degree.

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of France as well as the Embassy of the Republic of France in Slovakia, support the cooperation and students can receive attractive scholarships granted by the French government.

Similar cooperation has been established with several universities in Great Britain since 2006 and with the Khabarovsk State Academy of Law in Economics in Russia since 2016.

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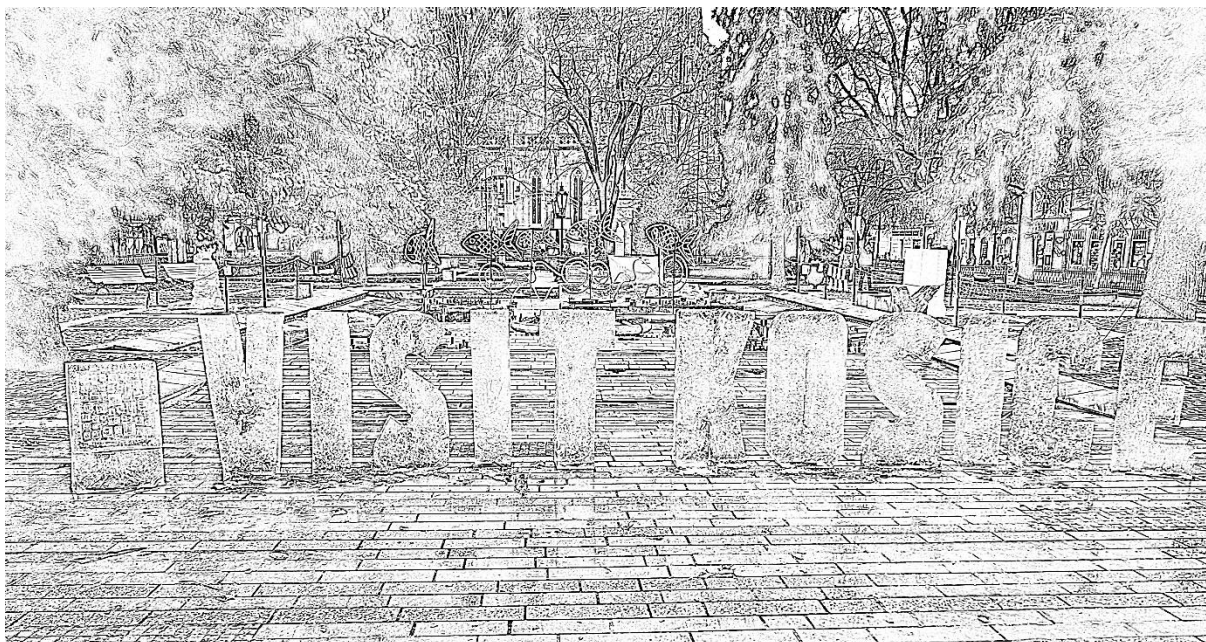
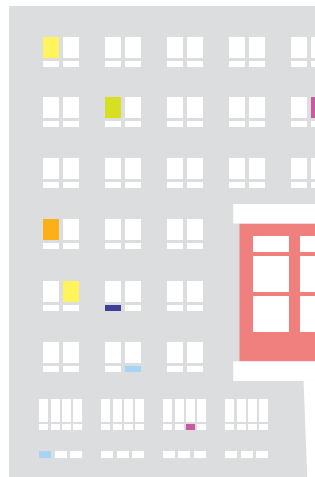


Fig. 12: State Theater in Košice - „Ice Kingdom”



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
